

Matt Hughes Publishes Bestseller

Ultimate Fighting Champion Matt Hughes ('95), famous as the nine-time World Welterweight Champion, has reached fame in a new venue.

His autobiography, "Made in America: The Most Dominant Champion in UFC History" has reached the New York Times Bestseller List after its January, 2008 publication. The book, co-written with Michael Malice, was published by Simon and Schuster.

Matt's talent as a wrestler was evident when he attended Lincoln College, placing third in the nation, with a 33-3 record for the Lynx. Wrestling Coach Dave Klemm recruited Matt and his twin brother Mark, natives of Hillsboro, IL, from Belleville Area Community College.

After earning his degree from Lincoln College, Matt had continued success in wrestling at Eastern Illinois University where he was a two-time NCAA Division I All-American at 158 pounds, placing eighth in 1996 and fifth in 1997.

Matt's love of competition took him to the sport of Mixed Martial Arts fighting. In 2001, Matt won the world welterweight title in the Ultimate Fighting Championships. He successfully defended his title eight times, more than any other fighter in the sport. One of his massive championship belts is on display in the Meyer-Evans Student Center at Lincoln College.

In his book, Matt describes growing up on a farm in Hillsboro, his high school and collegiate success as a wrestler and his rise to becoming one of the UFC's most successful fighters.

He also writes about his experiences at Lincoln College, including the friends he and his brother made and the influence of Coach Klemm.

"Dave Klemm was very motivating, on and off the mat," he added. "He used to remind us that we were buying our education so we should use it." "He'd always tell us, 'it's like going to a grocery store, paying for the groceries and leaving them on the check-out counter,'" Matt said. "We still tease him about it."

"I have to thank Dave Klemm," he said. "I wouldn't have gone on to Eastern without his help and he got me my All-American status."

"If I hadn't gone to Lincoln College, I'd be working a 9 to 5 job trying to provide for my family," Matt said in a recent interview. "The faculty was amazing. The one-on-one with the teachers and small classes were great. Otherwise, I would have gotten lost in the shuffle."

"My whole career comes from Lincoln," Matt added.

Matt has remained close to Dave Klemm over the years, coming back to wrestle with the Lynx wrestling team a couple of times a year.

Matt said he hopes his new book will give an accurate insight into his life.

LINCOLN COLLEGE LAUNCHES NEW MEDICAL PROGRAM

In the Fall Semester, 2007, Lincoln College welcomed 14 students to its Normal Campus from the University of Sint Eustatius Medical School (USESOM). These 14 students were part of USESOM's "Fifth Semester" program, the last semester in the two year basic medical sciences curriculum. In Spring Semester, 2008, 23 students journeyed from the Caribbean Island of Sint Eustatius (Netherlands Antilles) to complete their Fifth Semester in Illinois. Lincoln College and medical education? What is this all about, you may ask.

Over the course of the past 18 months, Lincoln College has developed a two-component partnership with USESOM to enhance opportunities for medical

education as well as to help reduce the shortage of physicians, particularly in Illinois. USESOM opened its doors in 1999 and in the course of its first decade has trained hundreds of physicians, most of whom are working now in the United States. USESOM's mission is similar to that of Lincoln College – to create opportunities for those who might have difficulty completing an educational program for whatever reason. Graduates of USEOM have enjoyed considerable success on the United States Medical Licensing Examinations and have been very successful in the most prestigious residency programs in the country.

The first component in the partnership is the one just described, wherein

students are given the opportunity to return to the United States to study, participate in preceptorships, and prepare for the first licensing examination. These students live in the residence halls on the Normal campus and study in a dedicated classroom space. A professor of medicine is resident on the Normal Campus. The second component is a pre-medical education opportunity for students on the Lincoln Campus. This two to three year pre-med program is scheduled to begin in Fall Semester, 2008. Students who successfully complete the pre-med courses at Lincoln have an automatic berth at USESOM for the basic medical science program.

The Presidential Post Goes to Press

Lincoln College students again have their own publication to learn about campus issues, activities and personnel.

The Presidential Post, the first student-oriented campus newspaper in more than a decade, published its inaugural issue Feb. 22.

In past years, Lincoln College was home to The Lincolnian student newspaper. The publication later changed its name to The Emancipator, but ended publication in the 1990's.

The Presidential Post is the brainchild of English instructor Tom Baer who teaches a news writing course at Lincoln College.

"While reading through the stories our students had written, it occurred to me we

really needed an outlet to let others see this material," Baer said. "I was impressed by the quality of writing and the topics of student concern."

To give his News Writing students broad experience, Baer is having them rotate assignments - covering features, opinion pieces, sports profiles, entertainment articles and other stories.

In the Feb. 22 issue, President John Hutchinson expressed his support of the new publication, noting that the newspaper - along with the expansion

of the WLNX radio station - provides a way to communicate with students.

The Presidential Post, the first student-oriented campus newspaper in more than a decade, published its inaugural issue February 22.

"There are limited opportunities to write opinions about various issues, to raise questions and I think this paper will give an outlet for that as well," he said.

The Presidential Post is currently being published bi-weekly.

Nationwide, campus newspapers are defying the trend of declining readership of daily newspapers. Instead, the campus newspapers thrive because their content is so relevant to their readers.

Lincoln College Set Alum on Lifelong Journey of Teaching

Education has always been an integral part of Juanita's life, from her childhood desire to be a teacher through her 40 years of teaching Latin, English and Math. She even married a fellow teacher who became superintendent of schools in Plainfield, IL, near Chicago. At age 102, Juanita now resides in Charlottesville, VA where her daughter lives.

Juanita had to overcome numerous challenges early in life to eventually enroll at Lincoln College. She fought measles, whooping cough and spinal meningitis as a toddler. Her father died when she was young, leaving her family with a severe financial hardship.

In an era when most women didn't go to college and scholarships were generally given to only male athletes, Juanita was pleased when her high school superintendent and her minister lined up a full scholarship to Lincoln College, which was a four-year institution at the time.

"Lincoln College was very good to me," Juanita said, noting the school gave her a job waiting tables in the dining hall for her meals. College officials also helped

her find jobs baby sitting and cleaning. For awhile she lived with a faculty family and worked for her room and board. "One job I had was reading to the college president's mother," Juanita said. "She lived with them and could no longer see, so she wanted me to read the Sunday School lesson and other books to her."

While at Lincoln College, Juanita's favorite subjects were Latin, languages and math.

"I originally thought I wanted to teach math, but I was warned that most small town math teachers were men who also coached, so I concentrated on Latin and languages," she explained.

Despite having grades that were the highest in school records while in high school, Juanita's college grades weren't quite as high because she had to work so much.

She found time for extra-curricular activities while at Lincoln College, though, including singing in the women's glee club and the mixed choir. "We didn't have sororities or

fraternities, but we had literary societies that you had to be asked to join," Juanita recalled. "I wanted to play basketball, but they practiced at 5 o'clock when I had to be setting the tables for dinner.

"We didn't have dances at Lincoln College, because the Presbyterians didn't believe in dancing," she said. "Sometimes we went into town to dance and sometimes we danced in the dorms."

Juanita obtained her first teaching job while a senior at Lincoln College.

"A small town near Lincoln lost its Latin and Spanish teacher part way through the year," she said. "They asked Lincoln College if they knew of anyone who might finish the year. They recommended me and excused me from attending many of my classes. They let me just take the exams and graduate, so I guess my grades were OK."

What's the secret of Juanita's longevity of body, mind and spirit? She attributes it to drinking three glasses of milk a day, eating moderately (she's never weighed more than 95 lbs.), never smoking or drinking, walking every day, doing crossword puzzles and never worrying.
